SUMMER SCHOOL

The District 'Summer School' started on 18 June at Essendon where we had an excellent attendance. 'Students' were divided into a number of groups –

- those who were learning Plain Hunt .
- those who were learning Plain Bob Doubles and/or Minor
- those who were learning Grandsire Doubles
- Those who were learning Plain Bob Major and Grandsire Triples

Barry Mack had prepared extensive notes and 'homework' for all the groups and after a 'theory session' the practical began. Plain Hunt on 5 was first on the agenda and several ringers managed this for the very first time.

Several courses of both Plain Bob Doubles and Minor followed and again some ringers achieved their 'First in Method'. A few 'touches' of Plain Bob were rung and finally some courses of Grandsire Triples.

On 16 July the second session was held at Kimpton and with Barry away on holiday, Claire Nicholson took the reins and soon had the learners practising their chosen methods. This included Plain Hunting on just 2 bells to help enhance bell-handling skills. The Hatfield learners in particular did find this useful. A number of other methods were rung up to Plain Bob Major.

On August 20th it was Welwyn's turn to host the event and this time Jen Johnson had the unenviable task of trying to give everyone a fair 'go' in the two-hour period.

Odette Coe attended all three courses and writes|:

At Essendon we started with a theory session discussing the concept of the method and then we had a go at Plain Hunt Doubles ringing from the number 2 bell position. The main area we all agreed that was needed was to improve our bell control so that we could strike it accurately when changing speed. At Kimpton we rang Plain Hunt on 2 bells (again from the number 2 bell) and we continued practising this on our Thursday evenings at Hatfield. This started to work really well as we had to ring at different speeds in a short space of time meaning that we really had to have the bell under control. At Welwyn we practised 'rapid-fire' Call Changes so that we were called up to the back and down to the front at almost every hand stroke and this too helped with our bell control on unfamiliar bells.

DEDICATION OF SANDRIDGE BELLS by Vivian Nutton

A Thanksgiving Evensong was held at Sandridge on Wednesday August 17 to thank all those who had contributed in any way to the rehanging and retuning of the bells. The bells were formally blessed by the Bishop of St. Albans, who took ringing as the theme of his sermon. He told of his fascination as a young ringer in Dorset with the mathematics of methods, even composing short touches on the way to school, and suggested that the organisation of methods could serve as a metaphor for the Christian life, whether simple or complex. Although each ringer had his or her own path, the success of the band depended on the common effort, unified by the method. Afterwards the Bishop came and rang a 120 with ringers from the District and beyond, before descending the stairs to chat with the many ringers and non-ringers who attended the service.
