The Debenham Bell Fund Changes Its Rules

Have you heard of the Debenham Bell Fund? It's a resource available to all of the 20 towers in the HCACR St Albans District, from which grants can be made towards the cost of repair, purchase, maintenance or renewal of bells, fittings, ropes or related church fabric. In recent years, there have been some concerns about whether the fund was being put to best use and, as a result, the matter was referred for consideration by the District Committee.

The Committee felt it is valuable for the District to have its own bell fund but proposed that changes could be made to the process for approving grants which would allow them to be made more quickly and efficiently. At the fund's recent AGM, it was agreed that the trustees should be given authority to make grants up to the value of £1,000 without calling a meeting to seek approval from the members, and the rules of the fund have been changed to reflect this.

If the project is a large one, a grant may nevertheless be possible but amounts of more than £1000 are subject to approval by the members. Alternatively or in addition, applications can be made to the HCACR Bell Restoration Fund.

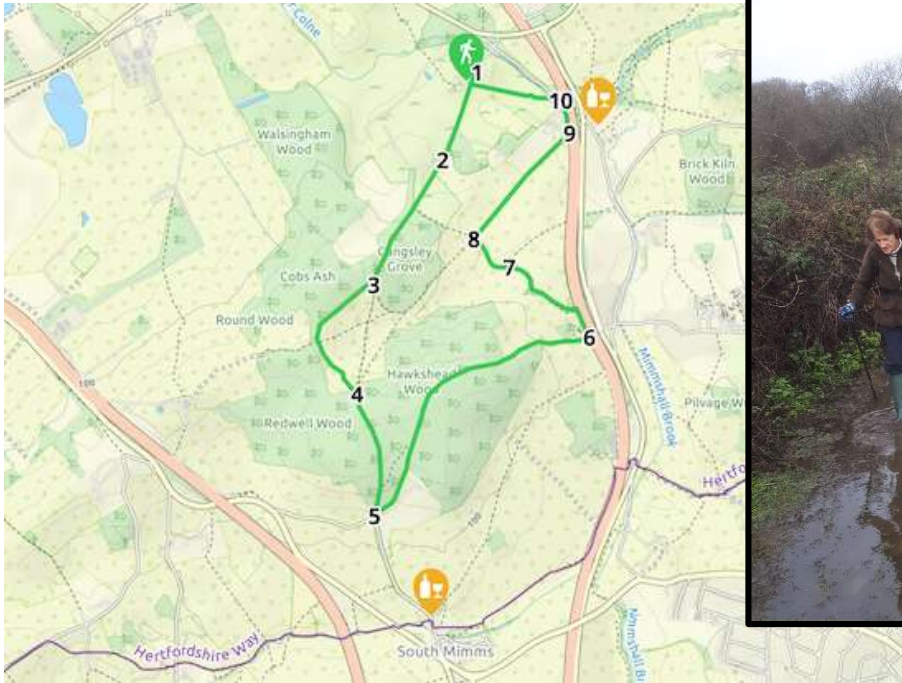
Strolls in the Park

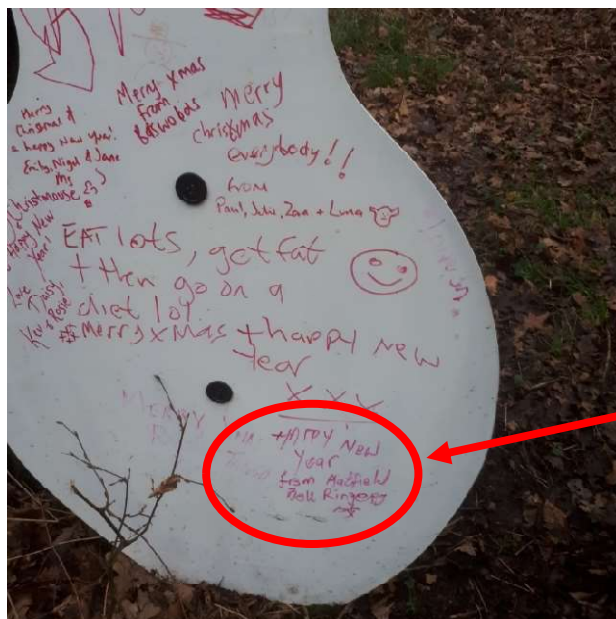
On New Years Day, the Hatfield bellringers met up at North Mymms church and set off on a walk of a few miles which incorporated part of North Mymms Park.

A Celebration of Trevor

The remarkable achievements of Trevor Hawkins as organist and ringer at Sandridge were celebrated at the Sunday morning service at Sandridge on January 22, when he was officially given the title of organist emeritus. He had originally been appointed in November 1953 for the time being following the tragic death of his predecessor in a motor cycle accident. Shortly



afterwards he took up ringing, and with a gap at the end of the 1970s he has been playing the organ and climbing the steep ladder to the belfry ever since. He served as Secretary and Steeple Keeper, and must have taught very many to ring. He was elected a College Youth in 1963, and has rung a number of peals around the country, and even appeared on USA television as a visiting ringer in Boston. He used to go regularly to Lemsford to help with teaching learners there. His most recent quarter was in February 2022 when he was 92 on the same bell that he rang for his first quarter in 1960.

Such long service would be reason enough for notice, but it is made even more remarkable by the fact that he was born in Walthamstow with severe deafness. He was made to sit at the front of the class at a deaf school in Margate so that he could hear the teacher shouting at him – these were the days before hearing aids! After running a seaside hotel in Hastings, his parents moved to St Albans for safety in the middle of the war, and he has remained there living in the same house ever since.

His mother in particular was musical and he inherited her musical ear, learning the piano at home and around 1950 the organ at the nearby church of St Saviour. He was interested in electronics, calibrating various instruments at Marconi's factory, and building himself a small portable electronic organ. He developed his skills further not only making small portable organs for friends, but also until his late eighties repairing church electric organs around the country as far North as Bradford. He rigged up his own sound system in church, to the bafflement of another deaf parishioner whose hearing aid used a different wavelength.

He is a skilled photographer, and several villagers have had their formal photographs taken by him. He has also been heavily involved in working for the deaf in the county, organising outings, fundraising, and even sitting in the front seat and using sign language while deaf friends took their driving tests. He demonstrated in church how to indicate an emergency stop. He has also helped to raise funds for medical and relief work in Nepal, and, since he is a shy man, there may be other aspects of his remarkable life that he has not revealed.

He will continue to ring and to play the organ during the Sunday service, but he has now handed over most of the playing to a (slightly) younger man – me.

A Day Out in Oxfordshire

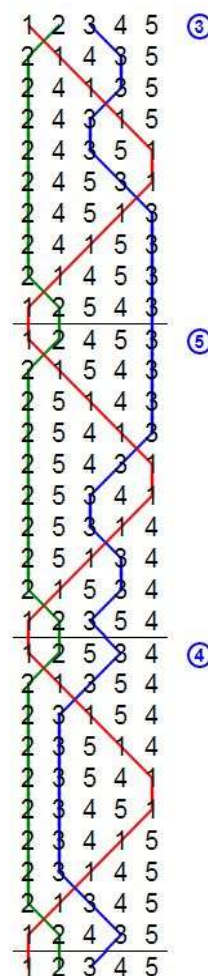

After a two year hiatus, it was lovely for the St Michael's band to be able to get on the road again for an autumn outing. This time, we went to south west Oxfordshire, visiting five ground floor rings not far from Abingdon. It was a fine sunny morning and, passing the Mini factory at Cowley on the Oxford ring road, we made good time, arriving a few minutes early at the first tower at Marcham.

An anticlockwise six (8cwt), the sallies were lovely, thick red and yellow ones, and the bells went well. The church's dedication is All Saints and the lady who let us in had mentioned that the local band ring the method of the same name, All Saints Place Doubles, so we followed suit. We also took the opportunity of ringing Oxfordshire Slow Course which we had learned specially for the occasion. The next tower was Steventon, an 11cwt six, the ropes for which hang just inside the church porch. The bells had recently been refurbished and one of the locals told us our timing was good, as they are much nicer now than they were before! The tower captain and steeplekeeper had very kindly laid on tea and coffee which was welcome on a fresh autumn day, especially as we were ringing with the church doors open to allow the air to circulate.

The church is on the western outskirts of the village and the approach road is crossed by the railway line connecting Didcot Parkway to Swindon. The level crossing was closed both on our way to ring and when we left: en route to the next tower, we had to wait for what seemed like ages until one Intercity train in each direction had rushed through.

This made us a few minutes late arriving at our first eight-bell tower of the day, Drayton (9 cwt). The ringing chamber was quite compact but the bells went nicely and, after an enjoyable three quarters of an hour, we were ready for lunch! The Plum Pudding in Milton had been recommended by the tower contact there. The pub was very busy, as they were hosting a beer festival that weekend, but the food came promptly. Apart from the opportunity to try some different beer, there was an added attraction in the shape of three steam engines which arrived while we were eating and parked outside.

The church at Milton is just across the road from the pub so everyone was able to have a good look at the steam engines on their way to afternoon ringing. The ring is a 6cwt eight and the ringing chamber is nice and bright.



The route to the final tower took us parallel to the River Thames and past the nature reserve at Wittenham Clumps to the village of Brightwell-cum-Sotwell. St Agatha's has eight bells (9 cwt) which were refurbished in 2016.

In addition to All Saints Place and Oxfordshire Slow Course Doubles, we rang a variety of methods throughout the day, including rounds (with and without called changes) at all the towers, Plain Bob Minor and Triples, as well as Grandsire, Stedman and Middlesex Bob Triples. All the bells went well and sounded lovely, so they were all a pleasure to ring. Even the people who normally say they don't like outings seemed to have enjoyed themselves!

Although St Michael's is an eight-bell tower, there are only seven of us in the band so it was great to be joined by ringing family members, as well as friends from other St Albans towers - thank you to everyone who supported us. Particular congratulations go to Eleanor Sage: her parents are both in the band so she's been coming on outings with us since she was a baby but this time, she rang in all the towers. Well done, Eleanor!
